## **Education for Senior Citizens?**

Latest figures in the US show a growing number of senior citizens joining the aeromodelling organisation AMA for the first time.

- Industry offers a wide range of "Almost Ready to Fly" (ARF)-models, prefabricated, covered and decorated.
- To go flying with them is just a question of money, instead of knowledge and skills.
- Handicrafts are superb training for heads! The hands are directly connected with important parts of our brain. To keep our hands skilled means to keep our minds moving.
- How to educate seniors to build and to fly model aircrafts?

## Magazines, the life blood of the hobby

- Mags like "Flying Models", "Model Aviation" or "Aviation Modeller International" keep skills alive and help newcomers to adapt.
- Several books written in English introduce into the whole universe of model building.
- In Germany even the leading "Flugmodell + Technik" (FMT)is focussed on the supply of the model industry only. Little guidance, no instructions "how to do".
- After several meetings and more than 10 hours discussion with the editors we succeeded with a new concept. Beginning with July I'm going to publish a series about techniques to design and to build classic model aircrafts.
